



In lieu of a written exam, computer engineering students spend several weeks completing a self-selected, self-directed final project. The main criteria are:


- Make something cool that has power going through it.

- Break one thing at a time.




NBA Shooting Charts in Python - Gregory Kelly used the Python matplotlib module to plot a heat map of statistical data pulled on demand from the web. Shown here are the places where you are likely to find Michael Jordan successfully making a shot in a particular season. Plan your defences accordingly.



Swagway - Nicolas Frisella and Kandace Reitzel worked to solve the dreaded inverted pendulum problem using an accelerometer, remote control module, Arduino, H-bridges, and two underpowered motors.



Self-Driving Car - Chris Faclaris and Sean Tank used XBee wireless, I2C, analog, and TTL serial connections to interface the ultrasound rangefinder, compass, GPS, and joystick remote to the on-board navigation computer. Pro tip: Troubleshooting a GPS in January is not fun.



Solar Charge Controller - Daniel Zenebe built a battery charge controller for an off-grid solar power system using an Arduino, MOSFET, and various passive components.


GRADE 11 COMPUTER ENGINEERING (TEJ3M) FINAL PROJECTS (CONTINUED)



Dave MK. 1 - Jake Durrer and Michael Pfeifer built a Raspberry Pi controlled car with a 3D printed remotely tilting Go-Pro camera mount. Python code mapped the Xbox controller input to the PWM signal outputs used to drive an H-bridge motor control chip.



Bluetooth Arduino Car - Quinn Mrowka and Brett Springer built an Android app using AppInventor to drive their Arduino-controlled car over a Bluetooth connection. Part of the chassis was 3D printed.



Arduino Alarm Clock - Jared Tapia built an alarm clock using an Arduino, real-time clock module, speaker, and LCD display.

BELL LET'S TALK DAYS

We celebrated Bell Let's Talk Day twice at St David this year. Given that the 31st was an exam day, we took the opportunity on January 24 to encourage students to tweet/post/watch videos and share positive ideas about mental wellness in an effort to reduce the stigma that prevents so many people from getting help.

Bell has 5 suggested pillars in their campaign to help reduce the stigma associated with mental illness - language matters, educate yourself, be kind, listen and ask, talk about it. We used January 24 to highlight those pillars by having students read announcements during each period of class with advice about being kind, using appropriate language, and where to get help both at school and in the community.

We also made suggestions about how to cope with exams. Students signed a full size banner with positive messages and made posters with positive messages on them. All of those were tweeted on the 31st in order to be part of the financial contribution.

On the 31st, more than 31 million posts were made in support of this campaign, meaning that Bell will donate in excess of \$6million to mental health initiatives
