As we move into the remaining 68 days of the school year, we continue to look forward to where the journey will take us.



IMPORTANT TERMS AND DEFINITIONS







Students, staff and visitors in Waterloo Region's Catholic Schools have the right to learn, work and be present in a safe and secure environment. However, the possibility of a major incident of violence is a reality which cannot be overlooked. Everyone who spends any amount of time in an Ontario school on a regular basis needs to know how to protect themselves in the event of a major incident or threat of school violence.

Creating a safe and secure learning environment for all is a top priority of the Waterloo Catholic District School Board. The use of correct terminology in a crisis situation is very important. Therefore, all school lockdown, hold & secure and shelter-in-place plans will clearly explain when and why the term 'Lockdown' versus other terminology is to be used.

The term '**Lockdown'** will only be used when there is a <u>major incident</u> or threat of school violence within the school or in direct relation to the school. All individuals inside the school will immediately move to the nearest secure location and doors will be locked.


The term 'Hold and Secure' will be used when it is desirable to secure the school due to an ongoing situation <u>outside</u> and <u>not related</u> to the school (e.g., a bank robbery occurs near a school but not on school property). In this situation, the school continues to function normally, with the exterior doors being locked until such time as the situation near the school is resolved.

The term 'Shelter in Place' will be used when it is necessary to hold all occupants inside the school to protect them from external situations such as chemical spills, blackouts, explosions or extreme weather conditions.


2018 ECOO WCDSB PROGRAMMING CHALLENGE





HUGE WIN FOR TEAM DAVE


We are excited to share that Team Dave, along with their alliance partners, won the recent UW FRC competition!

YOU ARE INVITED TO PARTICIPATE IN A RESEARCH STUDY:

Physical Activity and Sport for Young People in the Region of Waterloo

Purpose: Physical activity and sport are important for social, physical, and psychological development; however, there are many barriers that hinder families from becoming active. The purpose of this research is to examine the physical activity and sport involvement of young people within the Region of Waterloo and determine if there are any barriers to participation. The findings will be used to develop programs that fit the needs of families in the region.

About the Researchers: The two principal researchers are PhD candidates at Wilfrid Laurier University who are conducting this research with Sun Life's Centre for Physically Active Communities. The research advisors (Dr. P. Bryden, Dr. P. Fletcher, Dr. J. Robertson-Wilson, and Dr. M. Eys) are professors in the Department of Kinesiology and Physical Education.

Participants: Caregivers of children aged 4 to 18 who live in Kitchener, Waterloo, Cambridge, or the surrounding townships are invited to participate in this study.

Procedure: Caregivers will be asked to complete an online survey that requires approximately 20-25 minutes. This survey includes demographic information, as well as information about the children(s) participation in physical activity and sport.

After completing the survey, the caregiver has the opportunity to participate in an interview with one of the principal researchers to provide more details about physical activity and sport involvement in the Region of Waterloo. If interested, the caregiver will provide his/her contact information that will be separated from the survey data. Caregivers have no obligation to provide contact information, and they can withdraw this contact information from the researchers at any point in time.

Should you be interested in participating, you will be contacted within one month of providing your contact information. Your contact information will be stored on a password protected computer for up to five years. Your data from this study will be kept indefinitely, which allows for reanalysis in the future.
